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




Figure 1. DC Current Gain vs. Collector Current




Figure 3. Base-Emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Collector Current




Figure 5. Collector Cut-Off Current vs.
Ambient Temperature




Figure 2. Collector-Emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Collector Current




Figure 4. Base-Emitter On Voltage vs. Collector Current




Figure 6. Output Capacitance vs. Reverse Bias Voltage




Figure 7. Switching Times vs. Collector Current




Figure 8. Switching Times vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 9. Storage Time vs. Turn-On and Turn-Off Base Currents




Figure 10. Storage Time vs.
Turn-On and Turn-Off Base Currents




Figure 11. Fall Time vs.
Turn-On and Turn-Off Base Currents




Figure 12. Fall Time vs.




Figure 13. Fall Time vs.
Turn-On and Turn-Off Base Currents




Figure 14. Delay Time vs. Base-Emitter Off Voltage and Turn-On Base Current




Figure 15. Rise Time vs. Turn-On Base Current and Collector Current




Figure 16. Power Dissipation vs.




Figure 17. 3-LEAD, SOT23, JEDEC TO-236, LOW PROFILE
